# General Data Protection Regulations (25.5.2018) GDPR & the Herts Folk Association.

GDPR, the General Data Protection Regulations, are the new EU wide rules on data protection that came into force on May 25th this year. The new rules supersede the Data Protection laws that have existed and evolved since the 1980s

The HFA holds personal data on its members, provided by those members for the purposes of postal contact (Puddingstone) and non-routine information distribution.

#### GDPR statement.

The HFA holds personal data on its members, and affiliated clubs and groups provided by them for the purposes of postal contact (Puddingstone) and non-routine information distribution [Name, Address, Phone number, e-mail address].

This information is held only by the HFA Membership Secretary, and Committee members for distribution of Puddingstone, as password protected files.

Information is also held by the Puddingstone Editor for the purpose of contacting clubs and individuals using the Puddingstone for advertising, as a password protected file.

The HFA only holds and uses these data to meet its stated purposes:

Support and/or initiate all forms of folk activity in Hertfordshire.

Encourage the initiation of such activities by others.

To act as a liaison point for all forms of folk activity in Hertfordshire.

Personal data is not shared with any other organisation or persons without the express permission of the person concerned.

The GDPR emphasises that any personal information held must be with the permission of the person to whom it applies and that this permission must be recorded.

In order to comply and for us to continue to hold your personal information as explained above we must receive the tear-off slip below giving your express permission.

The GDPR requires the HFA to have means for people to see the personal data we hold on them and to request changes or deletion. To do this please contact *The Membership Secretary (Adrian Burrows)*, by letter or by e-mail and we will respond as required within one month of receipt of the request.

If you do not wish us to hold this information you can still be a member and receive information via our website (<a href="www.hertsfolkassn.org.uk">www.hertsfolkassn.org.uk</a>) or by our sending your copy of Puddingstone to the Club or Group of your choice.

# Spring Sing 2018



On a cold March day 8 singers, half of whom were members of the Waltham Abbey Folk Song Club, whilst the other half were from the North Herts area, met together in the back room of the Crown Inn in Buntingford. Between us we performed three dozen songs and poems across a wide range of genres, including the serious, the funny, solos, duets and choruses, traditional, modern, music-hall and self-penned, although being St Patrick's Day, there was a bit of an Irish theme which developed in the performances and emerged throughout the day, often with interesting and surprising results.

All the participants had a very enjoyable time, not only in singing, but also in catching up on news and gossip with friends not seen for some time. However, having noticed the snow outside was falling more heavily, we all decided that safety should be our watchword, so we finished well before the intended time, with an enthusiastic rendition, including chorus, of 'When All Men Sing'. We then all headed out to do battle with the elements and off home, while it was still safe to drive, considerably earlier than originally planned.

#### Third Kimpton Folk Festival

Its beginnings can be traced to a conversation I had with a local folk fan at one of the pub sessions I used to run. This was late 2014. She suggested a Kimpton Folk Festival, and I was quite cross to hear that suggestion because I knew the idea would stay in my head, and it did. So despite all sorts of misgivings, I contacted a group of the session regulars to explore the idea. We met in the local pub - established what it was we wanted to achieve and decided to go ahead with the idea. We formed a committee and hit on a date - 9 July 2016.

We had no idea what was involved, but we found out pretty quickly. Thanks to sponsorship and healthy ticket sales our first event was a financial and artistic success, so we continued. The second event built on the success of the first, with even greater revenue from ticket sales and so it continued.

I was lucky enough to be at the Kimpton Folk Festival on Saturday 7th July. As someone who had been a folk festival organiser, I've always been amazed how these guys have been able to create a day festival with such a range of good performers from scratch. The day started by



being greeted by lots of enthusiastic volunteers organising the car park, giving directions & handing out maps, and running the venues. As I walked through the area, I kept seeing bus stop signs marked 'Busk Stop' which were giving a great opportunity to new singers & musicians. There were 2 venues where you had to pay to get in & free acts on the village green and open sessions at the Boot. There were events for the children & the organisers

had realised that to run a day festival, food & drink were needed. Various food stalls dotted the village green & the Boot. It had been very well organised with signposts everywhere guiding people. The artistes were amazing & I enjoyed all of their shows. It was great to see so many young & talented performers from all over the country. One group had come from Bournemouth, another from Glasgow. Whoever selected the musicians had done an excellent job. There was klezmer music

from the London Klezmer Quartet complete with one of those fiendishly complicated Russian accordions which has more buttons than Concorde. There were workshops on spoon playing, poetry, singing, ukulele & Indian dancing. The one slight disappointment was



the lack of dance although there was a ceilidh on the village green run by a very enthusiastic caller.

But one of the nicest things about this festival was the way that the organisers had managed to integrate it with village life. It wasn't a case 'folkies & town', but the feeling that the village was part of the festival. I look forward to next year's festival.

#### The Hertfordshire Playford Day

#### Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> November 2018 Beaumont School, St Albans

John Playford, a London publisher, published books of country dances, starting in 1651 and continuing for over 50 years, such was their popularity. They were largely sold to the emerging middle-class, and now represent a treasury of English dancing enjoyed by all levels of society from the court downwards. Then with changing fashions, Playford's books were largely forgotten about.

In the early 20<sup>th</sup> Century, Cecil Sharp discovered a copy of the First Edition of Playford's books, and produced and popularised edited copies of these, and his interpretations of the dances are now well-known and largely regarded as the definitive versions.

Thanks to a gift to the HFA, we're going to have a day to introduce dancers and musicians to the delights of Playford dancing, and to give experts some of the latest thoughts about Playford's dances. To this end, we have engaged three different, expert tutors – Anne Daye, Andrew Swaine & John Dipper.

Anne Daye is an inspiring and knowledgeable teacher of historical dance, and a leading expert of dancing in Playford's London. With extensive experience of leading dancers of all levels of ability in workshops on the country dances, she will teach skills of stepping and figuring alongside information on the social setting of the time. Andrew Swaine is a lifelong folk dancer, caller and musician. In 2016 he ran a cumulative 23¾ hours of workshops on Playford era dances at Sidmouth folk festival, featuring a large number of new reconstructions, and last year ran a week of workshops on Playford dances and interpretation in California. His goal is to rediscover what originally made these dances fun, by an unpretentious approach backed up with extensive research.

John Dipper (violin, concertina) is an internationally renowned musician, composer and teacher, with a deep knowledge of Playford music, and he will be leading a parallel workshop for musicians, working with them on the same dances as Anne & Andrew. The musicians will then play for the evening dance that culminates the day.

Children are welcome, but **must** be accompanied by a responsible (paying) adult.

We'll provide tea, coffee, sugar, milk, & hot water, but please bring your **own lunch**. We'll provide a simple buffet supper to eat at teatime. (Vegetarian option available, but please let us know about other special dietary requirements). Please also bring your own tea/coffee mug so that we don't have to throw away too many plastic cups.

Musicians will need to be able to play at dancing speed, and also need to be able to read music – the notation will be sent out in advance (by email) so you can practice beforehand. You will be playing for the evening dance! Most acoustic instruments should be OK, but note that if your instrument only plays in a couple of keys, you may not be able to play all the tunes.

Please also note that the school does **not** allow any food or drink inside the studio (where the musicians will be practicing) except water in a closable bottle – so you may want to bring a water-bottle! No smoking is allowed on the site.

There is ample parking at the school. Maps will be sent out with the tickets – probably in September when the current building works at the school have been completed.



#### WOODFEST

Woodfest this year is on again, 7-9th September, at National Trust Hatfield Forest near Takeley, Bishops Stortford. As well as the main stage we are organising the Open Mic Acoustic Stage, also informal music sessions, which seldom stop. Chris and Lesley from Royston Folk Club, Jonathan Gatward, Martyn Hewitt and myself will be running the Open Mic Acoustic stage. There will be Barn Dances with bands on part of the Saturday and Sunday afternoons. We are now asking for performers to contact us, if you'd like a spot on our stage. #### Folk at the Maltings: Walter Harvey Hallam (an ordinary man)

In November, Folk at the Maltings will be on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup>, rather than on a Friday and will feature a one act play by Alison Raymond. Walter Harvey Hallam was a draper in east London as the horror of World War One was unfolding in Europe. His middle name 'Harvey' reflected a long established family tradition honouring his direct ancestral link to William Harvey, doctor to James 1st and discoverer of the circulation of the blood. Towards the end of 1915 Walter enlisted as a volunteer soldier in the Essex regiment and on July 1st 1916 he found himself cast into the horror of the first day of the battle of the Somme.

This short one act presentation tells the story of Walter's progress to that place and time and of his brief combat experience. Nothing can whitewash the obscenity of industrial warfare and no play can replicate the horror, but through spoken word, song and music we hope to honour the memory of Walter and of all who bravely served and suffered in the hope of securing a better World. The evening will be at the Maltings Arts Theatre, St Albans and will start at 8pm.

# St Albans Folk Festival Friday Folk beginners night and Swedish workshop

On 15 June Friday Folk hosted a 'beginners' evening', called by Bob Barrett, to coincide with the St Albans Festival. We were also joined by Spånga Folkdansgille, a Swedish dance side from Spånga, near Stockholm, who were guests of English Miscellany for the weekend.

Friday Folk is a friendly social dance group, dancing a variety of mainly English and American dances. We welcome new members at any time during the year, but took the Festival as an opportunity to particularly encourage less experienced dancers or those who wanted to try folk dancing for the first time. Some people joined us after seeing our adverts out and about, and existing dancers also brought along friends. Bob took the evening at a slower pace than usual, clearly explaining the moves to some simple but still lively dances. It was great to see new faces having fun and gaining confidence as the evening progressed - we hope they will join us again in the future!

Later, Spånga Folkdansgille, dressed in traditional costume and led by Bertill, gave a short performance and taught us some Swedish steps – we were all beginners at that! They were accompanied by fabulous music from Tania Simon on the nyckelharpa and some of English Miscellany's own musicians. The display included a dance called 'Sollerön' (named after an island in the Dalarna district), a waltz, and the 'Midsommer-hambo'. We then attempted a polka, a shottis (which involved lots of clapping), and a waltz. The waltz was a circle dance with a change of partners each time through... but with the men waltzing the lady on their *left*.

Since old habits die hard and we all grasped this twist at different times there was much laughter and more than one abandoned partner! We also had a go at the ambitious 'hambo', a couple dance with the partners giving significant weight, almost in a sitting position, to step around each other.

#### St Albans Folk Festival - 2018 (New Moon Morris)

This was the first St Albans Folk Festival that I had done, although New Moon Morris have done several. Following advice, we got there early. Parking can be very difficult for Morris dancers at Festivals, but fortunately there was good parking arranged near to the Town Centre – however, we had been told that it fills up early. St Albans is a busy market town, and there was a full market going on in the town centre, so we found ourselves weaving between the stalls, trying to avoid distractions, to get ourselves some tea or coffee to wait for the dancing to begin.

There were a lot of interesting sides waiting to dance in the area in front of the St Albans Arena – it's always a good thing to be able to see other sides dancing – you can check out how good they are and watch for good moves and interesting dances. You also get the chance to catch up on friends and make new ones – sharing cards with the other sides so that you can meet up to dance at some time.

All the sides danced once outside the Arena, then they split up into groups of three or four sides to dance at various locations around the Town. Our first spot was outside Ye Olde Fighting Cocks – a pub dating back to the 8th Century - with Ramrugge Clog Morris and Hemlock Morris, both excellent sides. We danced on a paved area, with our New Moon musicians teetering over the River Ver.

Then back into the town to dance by the 'almost unique' Clock Tower, this time with English Miscellany, a side which dances in many styles, with magical costume changes in between dances, and also with a visiting Swedish dance group, Spanga Folkdansgille. There was a good crowd of appreciative locals watching us as we danced. It is a friendly festival. After a break for lunch we headed to the West Door of St Albans Abbey, to dance with English Miscellany and the Swedish group again. I found the Abbey fascinating, although we were too busy to be able to go inside. Robert Runcie, former Archbishop of Canterbury, is buried there. The West Door is a magnificent stone edifice, while the eastern end is largely built of 'half dressed' flints and Roman bricks 'robbed' from Verulamium. Embedded in amongst the flints are large pieces of what looks like concrete – stone with smaller pebbles embedded within it. It is, in fact, Hertfordshire Puddingstone, formed millions of years ago. Dancing outside the West Door proved to be a little difficult. Because of local conditions there was a howling gale coming from the South,

whipping our hats off as we danced and snatching away the strains of music coming from our musicians, all allowing for a degree of unexpected extemporising in our dancing. Finally, all sides gathered again outside the West Door, and we were treated to some excellent dancing as a finale. We did our dance but New Moon Morris were invited by Wicket Brood who were in the final dance spot to join with them, and with Phoenix Morris in a huge dance of 'Worcestershire Monkey' – a fantastic dance that involves loads of hitting sticks and hollering. For New Moon Morris it was the perfect end to an excellent day of dancing. Dancing with friends to a huge band of musicians, outside the ancient Abbey, with a large and appreciative crowd. It might have been my first St Albans Folk Festival, but I very much hope to be dancing there again next year.

#### St Albans Folk Festival 2018 (English Miscellany)

The weather was kind to everyone from the first dance to the last song. The massed display in front of the Alban Arena was well received by a large crowd who stayed attentive for most of the show. Spanga Folkdansegille, Swedish guests of English Miscellany, danced throughout the day, and finished with a short specially prepared dance piece at the beginning of the Festival concert at the Maltings in the evening, showing dances from around Sweden, especially the Sami peoples of the north, closely related to native North Americans, and the peoples of the Kamchatka Peninsula.

Young Miscellany completed the show with a participative Maypole session encouraging young audience members to get involved with winding the ribbons in intricate patterns around the Pole and then unwinding them, all to music. As this was happening the other dance sides moved off to the various venues around the town to entertain the good people of St Albans, many of whom enjoyed the additional entertainment applied to their Saturday shopping but a number did not get into the mood at all and complained about their passages being blocked by dancers! You simply cannot please all the people all the time.

Seventeen or eighteen dance sides from around the county, country and Europe with numerous musicians leading sessions and sing arounds, St Albans city centre came to life with the sights and sounds of the Folk Tradition. It is a shame that the City cannot make more of this event and enable more dancing in the main thoroughfares, rather than the lanes and byways. Promoted by the City Council as part of its cultural programme, the shops and market traders could all benefit from dramatically increased footfall, as the Festival would get bigger each year with positive support. Certainly the dancers danced their feet off during the day, enjoying the weather and the crowds, finishing outside the West Doors of the Abbey Church with a final massed dance.

Looking forward to St Albans 2019.

#### St.Albans Day of Dance 2018. (Tappalachian)

The common feature for onlookers at Christopher Place was easily detectable, for all the dances had been brought to this country from abroad. The lively Indian dance group, the Purnagyan Dance Academy, in their bright orange costumes, including tiny ankle bells, brought the surprise of yellow duster hankies being wafted high in an elegant echo of Cotswold cousins. Two other local groups were involved, "Louise Walsh" and "Rinceoiri le Cheile" Irish Dancers, who brought their dances across the sea from Ireland. These were youthful and bounding in energy both when gracefully performing in their light shoes and then with so much purpose in their taps. To complete the cultural invasion. Tappalachian brought their music and dances from the backwoods of the Appalachian mountains, where the old time traditions of migrants and indigenous folk lingered just long enough for 'party pieces' to be blended into lively dances, to the authentic 'American old time music' which is portrayed so well by the band. # A reflection on St Albans Folk Festival Day of Dance from one member of St Albans Morris

The day was fine but windy with a threat of rain (remember that idea); I was even debating if I needed the "wet weather" accordion and when it was approaching our turn to dance at the Arena show I asked one of our non-dancers to be on standby with an umbrella! That initial show, outside The Alban Arena, is a great chance to see who is around and to do some catching up with members of other sides and members of the public. The range of dance styles was really diverse; everything from traditional Costwold and North West to more modern interpretations of Border and other Morris styles so that many sides now have a clear dance identity as well as that of their kit. One of the things I really enjoy about this part of the day is seeing how each side is progressing, the changes in how they are dancing and observing who has new recruits, which many do, and it really does indicate that Morris Dancing in its widest definition is alive and well. Then it's off on our different "tours". 5 different locations this year and a mammoth amount of planning to get this all in place and we all headed off after consulting lists and other people in our sides. This year St Albans Morris started at the West Door of the Abbey with Whitethorn Morris, Phoenix Morris and Queen's Oak Border Morris. Whitethorn are a ladies North West side from Harrow, their dances originating from Cheshire and Lancashire are danced to a strong band and at lively tempo with great energy. With their blue and red costumes and high kicking they got everyone's attention from the start and they are friends of long standing to St Albans Morris. Phoenix are a mixed side based in Rickmansworth who dance mainly Cotswold dances with a style that they have developed over the years and they provide a nice contrast to the St Albans

Morris style and although they are mixed were predominantly female on the day apart from their inimitable (and sometimes inaudible) Phoenix. Their costumes of black waistcoats, skirts and britches with red hankies and legs and plenty of ribbons and flowery hats certainly takes the eye. Queen's Oak were new to me and are a Women's Border Morris side from Northamptonshire. For some Border Morris conjures up images of painted faces, intimidating costumes, noise and mayhem but Queens Oak gave us a different interpretation with no sign of face paint and a relatively restrained use of tatters. Really nice dancing with a real emphasis on togetherness and intricate sticking pattern. St Albans Morris (no longer Morris Men) have been around for ever (in morris terms) but surprised everyone, ourselves included by having enough dancers for two sides of dancers for this show and the following one at the Fighting Cocks. We are still sticking to a very traditional style of Cotswold Morris and for those who don't know us our kit is white shirts and trousers, blue baldricks with trimmings of yellow (St Albans colours of course). So, four contrasting sides in both style and costume enjoying the wonderful acoustics and paved surface provided by the location outside the Abbey and getting a good range of dances and which entertained ourselves and the reasonable audience. Next to The Fighting Cocks, just down the hill. A much more intimate performance space and with the same group of dance sides equally enjoyable, especially as it gave us all a chance of liquid refreshment. As lunchtime was free, I had a look in at the music session at The Goat, sadly the session did not seem to have a great momentum and with the lack of any "festival options for a guick meal I moved on and ate my sandwiches watching the tail end of a choir who were performing near Nationwide and Ladbrokes, which was our next spot. For this show Phoenix had been replaced by Chiltern Hundreds. They are a mixed North West side and, while technically based in Bushey where they practice, they are almost a national side with many of their dancers travelling incredible distances to be part of it. With a really strong band and a distinctive dark green costume with black and yellow trim their shows are always powerful and exciting and one of the day's dancing highlights was a double dance they performed here with Whitethorn. Two great North West sides with distinctive costumes and similarities in style. Really good to watch.

The final dance session of the day was back at the West Door of the Abbey with all sides participating in rather more blustery conditions. After that I went to The White Hart Tap and sat down to a drink with one of key organisers and member of St Albans Morris, Trevor and we were joined by a couple from Hemlock Morris. There was just time for a final dance highlight of the day when Tower Ravens, a women's rapper side came into the pub and took advantage of the wooden floor to give a superb performance of rapper.

All in all a fabulous day when I had a chance to see so many different dances and styles (maybe we need an I-spy type identity chart), meet so many people and find convivial company throughout the day. Excellently organised as always and a pleasure to be part of it, especially as for once I did not have to rush off to work in the evening.

# Saturday 16 June 2018: St Albans Festival Concert with The Dovetail Trio and Granny's Attic

Organiser Alison Macfarlane had assembled a varied and talented line-up for this year's main concert on the Saturday evening of this year's festival.

The concert opened with a display of three dances by Spånga Folkdansgille, a dance group from Sweden, augmented by additional musicians from English Miscellany. Of special note were an interesting figure in the waltz set, and the bewildered looks on the reindeer's faces in the reindeer herding dance! New Roots 2018 finalist Lizzy Hardingham, accompanying herself on guitar, gave a very confident performance of mainly self penned material, before 'Granny's Attic' took the stage.

Cohen Braithwaite-Kilcoyne (Vocals, Melodeon, Concertina,), George Sansome (Vocals, Guitar) and Lewis Wood (Vocals, Fiddle, ) showed why they are in such demand for festivals around the country with a mixed and lively set of songs (mostly Traditional) and Dance Tunes (penned by Lewis). Their diction is clear, their harmonies are strong, and they have a talent for not allowing the instruments to drown out the songs, yet add some real drive in the instrumental breaks. The second half opened with Watford Folk Club song writing competition winner Julian Mount, with unexpected backing singer Linda Birmingham adding well to his performance, helping to emphasise the humour in some of the songs, the two finishing with his winning song 'Skeletons in my Closet'.

The final act was the award-winning Dovetail Trio. This now well established trio - BBC Radio 2 Folk Award nominee Jamie Roberts, BBC Performing Arts Award winner Rosie Hood, and Newcastle Folk Degree alumnus Matt Quinn are a three-part harmony group — sometimes un-accompanied, but mostly backed by Jamie's brilliant guitar work and Matt's concertina - introduced an interesting selection of less-well known versions of traditional songs from the south of England. In particular I enjoyed 'The Banks of Green Mossing', and the more familiar (though not performed so much recently) 'Claudy Banks'. Beautiful!

It was a bold move for Alison to put together two such seemingly similar trios for her headline acts, and yet the differences between them were brought out by this juxtaposition without either appearing inferior to the other. It all made for a great evening of faultlessly classy music.

The one sour note was the two gentlemen who sat themselves on the front row either side of the centre aisle, and took photographs continuously through the first half of the concert in a very distracting manner. The people in the audience around me were all muttering about this, but fortunately someone spoke to them in the interval, so this did not continue while the Dovetail Trio were performing. It is time in my view for Folk Music venues to follow the lead of the theatre world and ban photography while concerts are in progress.
